2011 Census of Population, Households and Dwellings in the Republic of Serbia

Book 23: Dwellings for Permanent Habitation According to the Number of Rooms and the Floor Space

In the book "Dwellings for Permanent Habitation According to the Number of Rooms and the Floor Space" the Statistical Office of the Republic of Serbia publishes the final results of the 2011 Census of Population, Households and Dwellings¹⁾ on dwellings for permanent habitation according to the number or rooms and the floor space by municipalities and cities.

The 2011 Census was carried out during the period from 1st to 15th October, 2011, in compliance with the Law on the Census of Population, Households and Dwellings ("The Official Gazette of the RS," no. 104/09 and 24/11). The 2011 Census is financially supported by the European Union which has participated in the total costs with 60%.

A total of 3,012,923 dwellings for permanent habitation were enumerated in the Republic of Serbia. If observed according to the number of rooms per dwelling, the biggest share of the dwellings in the Republic of Serbia have two rooms, 34.6%, there are a little less three-room dwellings, 27.9%, then come one-room dwellings, 15.3%, and four-room dwellings, 12.7%, while the share of the dwellings with 5 and more rooms is 9.5%.

In comparison with the 2002 Census data, only the number of dwellings with one room went down in absolute terms. The total number of dwellings with two, three and more rooms went up, while the number of dwellings with three rooms increased the most. According to the structure of their respective shares, the percentage share of dwellings with one and two rooms went down in comparison with the 2002 Census, while the share of dwellings with three and more rooms went up.




The 2011 Census was not carried out on the territory of the AP Kosovo and Metohia, while the coverage of the census units in the municipalities of Presevo and Bujanovac was decreased owing to the boycott by the majority of the Albanian ethnic community.

Number of dwellings for permanent habitation according to the number of rooms, thous.



If observed by regions, two-room dwellings are most numerous in all the regions. One-room dwellings are most predominant in the Belgrade region, while most of the dwellings with five and more rooms are to be found in the Vojvodina region.

55.2% of the enumerated dwellings in the Republic of Serbia have the floor space between 41 and 80 m². If we observe only the dwellings in urban settlements, 76.3% of the dwellings are less than 80 m², while the share of the dwellings of up to 80 m² in other settlements is less and amounts to 67.1%. Out of the total number of the enumerated dwellings in other settlements, almost one quarter (23.4%) account for the dwellings with the floor space between 81 and 120 m².

If observed by municipalities and cities, the dwellings in the municipalities of Trgoviste and Priboj have the lowest average useful floor space, 54.4 m², then come Majdanpek with 55.6 m² and Crna Trava with 56.4 m². The dwellings in the municipalities of Veliko Gradiste and Malo Crnice have the average floor space of over 100 m², with 103.1 m² and 100.5 m², respectively.
